

Descriptive paragraphs should **show and not tell** the reader. You want to let the reader experience something themselves and you do this with details! This means one paragraph will have ***fewer ideas, and more details.***

example

Tell: The success David has achieved is beyond anyone's expectations and he has accomplished it at a young age that no one could have imagined.

Show: David became a manager, at 22, after working in the car dealership for six months because of his friendliness, competence, and high sales.

What are the five senses?

Tell: I am good at English.

Tell: Winnipeg is cold in the winter.

Michael was a unsatisfactory coworker whom I envied for the amount of praise he received from the other teachers at my school in Korea. Although Michael's work was below average, he got an above average amount of praise for his teaching abilities. I can still hear the kind voice of my boss as she praised him for having so much teaching experience. I can see the dull and mistake-filled materials he would share with me if we ever taught the same lesson. My face and body would tense up when I would hear my boss thank him for how hard he worked. I envied the amount of praise he got from my boss even if I didn't think he deserved it.

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
